Luke's Youth on a Wednesday afternoon after school started as a means for youth from our church to receive teaching that is geared towards them. It has been heartening to see this group develop a loving culture & consistent attendance.

Several teenagers who attend other churches in town come to Luke's youth on a weekly basis as well as some unchurched youth. And when shy or hesitant young people turn up they are warmly welcomed, included in activities, treated kindly and go home smiling. This is a safe place for them and for others to have Scripture, socialisation and smoko (a.k.a. snacks).

For example, Joanne invited a boy who doesn't go to school and was initially really shy. But he has quickly felt very comfortable and readily contributes in Bible study, despite saying at the start that he's not a Christian.

Please pray for the youth to stand firm in God's Word, become mature and assured of God's love for them (Col 4:13).

We were excited to see core members really grasp the vision of reconnecting with people in our community who feel a bond with St Luke's or with the Anglican (or CofE) church in general. They took charge in looking through lists of old contacts, praying for them by name, and personally inviting them along. Give thanks for the connections (and re-connections) made and the partnership in making this happen. Pray that many of these would join God's people at St Luke's throughout the year.

Emerald evenings

After prayer and preparation, we started an evening service on 26 October. We don't have a huge launch team, but we believe it will connect with a wider range of people than our morning meeting can. Our first service saw two new families join us.
